2021 PROJECT UPDATES

MONUMENT SIGNS

The heritage neighborhoods received updated monument signs constructed of quality stone and surrounded by new landscaping to complement the signs. The idea of removing the old wooden signs and replacing them with a more modern look was meant to make the entrances more aesthetically appealing and welcoming.

TOT LOTS

Autumn Woods received a new tot lot, in the fall of 2021. The pea gravel did not meet ADA recommendations and was replaced with ADA-approved hardwood chips. A new park bench and equipment with accessibility features were added.

The Tuscany Hills tot lot is currently under construction with an expected completion by November 1, 2021. The plastic edging was removed, a new concrete surround was added and pea gravel was replaced with ADA-approved wood chips. One tree was replaced and a new park bench was added.

MAIL PAVILIONS

The old mail station pavilions in Neighborhood 8 were removed and new, roadside mailboxes were installed. The asphalt was removed and will be replaced with landscaping and seating.

USPS has approved transitioning to new mail pavilion locations in Neighborhoods 4, 5 and 7. Mail stations will be roadside and will be conveniently located, to better serve residents. All remaining mail pavilions are scheduled to be replaced by end of 2023.

ACTIVITIES COMMITTEE

ELECTION COMMITTEE

The purpose of the election committee is to fairly and legally administer all board of directors elections in accordance with applicable Jonathan Association by-laws. The election committee is granted the powers and authority to carry out the task of nominating individuals to The Jonathan Association Board of Directors. As such, they are tasked with the administration of all aspects of the election process.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The responsibility of the executive committee is to act on behalf of the full board of directors, between meetings and when the board is not in session.

to go swimming, jump off of the dock


or play ping pong in the pavilion.

EMERALD ASH BORER

The association is following the progression of emerald ash bore with Jonathan. Qualified arborists are working to lay out the best strategic plan to tackle the disease.

If you have ash trees on your property, it is recommended to have them assessed by a qualified arborist.

WHAT IS EMERALD ASH BORER?

Emerald ash borer (EAB) is an invasive forest insect, from Asia. It is responsible for the deaths of millions of ash trees, throughout the eastern half of the US and southeastern Canada. EAB infests and kills weak and healthy ash trees, alike. All species of ash that are native to North America are vulnerable to EAB attack.

Most of the EAB life cycle takes place below the bark.

Woodpeckers readily feed on EAB larvae and often reveal infested trees during the winter months. These trees become covered in light-colored "flecking" as woodpeckers remove the outer bark. As tunnels from feeding larvae accumulate, trees begin to show signs and symptoms of EAB infestation. Once trees have started to show symptoms, they generally die within one to three years.

Emerging adult beetles chew characteristic 1/8-inch, D-shaped exit holes. These can be useful in confirming infested ash trees, although the holes can be difficult to find because of their small size and because they are frequently located high in the tree.

The map, below, shows the emerald ash borer status in Minnesota. Become knowledgeable about recognizing EAB and remain vigilant to the condition of your ash trees.
